



NEW PSN VISION STATEMENT (ver. 03-2019)





Case Definition: (1) County of residence listed as Santa Clara County, (2) Death occurred in state of California, (3) Decedent 10 to 24 years of age, (4) Manner of death listed as suicide.

Data Source: Emergency Department Data (2005-2014), Patient Discharge Data (2003-2014)

Population: (1) Patient was 10 to 24 years of age, (2) Patient was a resident of Santa Clara County, and (3) Visit/hospitalization was for suicide attempt/self-injury. Suicide attempt/self-injury was defined based on the principal or any other diagnosis coded with ICD-9 external cause of injury codes (E-codes) in the range 950.0–959.9, corresponding to suicide attempt and self-inflicted injury.

PALO ALTO COMMUNITY PERCEPTION OF YOUTH SUICIDE

- Top 5 Perceived Risk Factors
 - 1. Depression, mental health issues
 - 2. Academic distress or pressure
 - 3. Disconnected, socially isolated
 - 4. Family or cultural pressure
 - 5. Life challenges
- ▶ 89.1% of respondents perceived youth suicide as a problem in Palo Alto
- 82.4% of respondents perceived suicide to be preventable
- ▶ 71.0% of respondents reported they would know where to get help for a friend or family member thinking about suicide

HOW: THE JOURNEY LEADING TO NEW STATEMENTS

- Secured Mosaic Consulting and Coaching to facilitate process
- Input from an online stakeholder survey
- Meetings with the PSN Executive Advisory Board, PSN Leadership Team, and Community Partners.
- > Feedback from this process includes participants'
 - Preference for concise statement options (i.e. "keep it short)
 - Positive response to the inclusion of youth "empowerment"
 - > Suggestion of the term "mental wellness," and to retain emphasis on prevention
 - > Desire to lift up that youth and community members are in this work together
- Final adoption by PSN Executive Advisory Board


